40 challenges for the 40 days of Lent. Do them all; do one 40 times; try one per week; do whatever is most meaningful for you this Lent.

- Check in with someone you haven't spoken to in a while.
- Do a small act of service (or a chore for children) without being asked.
- Say a prayer for someone with whom you disagree.
- Grab your phone and text a positive message to five random people.
- Write/color a card and send it to someone, or even an organization.
- Cook a special meal or bake a treat as a surprise to a neighbor! Consider attaching a word of thanks or a prayer to it as well.
- Share online something for which you are grateful.
- Practice patience today, let someone else go before you in whatever that might be.
- Compliment a stranger.
- Embrace the golden rule today and treat everyone as you want to be treated, even if it is difficult.
- Write a positive review for a local business.
- Pay for the person behind you in a drive-thru.
- Self-kindness is important! Block out 30 minutes today to do something that makes you happy.
- Forgive today, whether it is something trivial or a lingering, divisive dispute.
- Leave a thank you note for service workers, such as the mail carrier or garbage collector.
- Using a dry erase marker, write a note of encouragement on your mirror for yourself or family members.
- Send an email to a former teacher who has made an impact in your life.
- Spend today being extra grateful.
- Send an email or note to a coworker who deserves more recognition.
- Shop local today and give your thanks to those who keep our communities' identity alive.

- Buy extra food at your grocery store and donate it to a food bank or parish kitchen.
- If you are out and about today, go out of your way to compliment a parent.
- Open doors for others.
- Go through your closet and donate items you might not need any more.
- Try your best to eat as healthy as possible today-appreciate and love your body!
- Spend 15 minutes in quiet reflection.
- If the weather is nice, spend time outside today.
- Think like a traveler today. Appreciate all that is around you and see everything in its beauty as though it is your first time seeing it.
- Think positively today.
- Start putting away spare change for a designated charity today.
- Write something down for only you to see that is thoughtful and meaningful.
- Listen to a prayerful podcast.
- Spend time with the Bible today; maybe even mark a few pages/lines that resonate with you.

JPDATES FROM SISTERS AT AFFILIATE SCHOOLS

Back at St. Anthony

Many people don't realize that the Sisters of Notre Dame first taught at St. Anthony School in Taylor Mill, KY, in 1902. Father Henry Looschelders, the first pastor at St. Anthony Church, asked the sisters to teach in the basement of the church. The sisters came from Mother of God daily by train for four years.

Today, Sr. Mary Suzanne Rose is in her third year teaching Pre-Algebra to a select group of seventh graders at St. Anthony. She prepares them to take Algebra at nearby Holy Cross High School when they are eighth graders. From St. Anthony each day,

Sr. Mary Suzanne goes to Holy Cross where she assists in an Algebra I class and a Senior Topics' class.

Sr. Mary Ellen Strunk is in her second year of sharing the Spanish language with students at St. Anthony. They range from 5 - 14 years old. She says her enthusiasm makes up for whatever she doesn't know of the language. The children seem to appreciate the opportunity.

Sr. Mary Ellen shared that she walked into the first/second grade room one day to find everyone but little Simon there. Then she heard his voice, "Hola, Hermana!" He was there grinning on the screen of an iPad sitting on his desk with his mom seated next to him.

One morning each week, Sr. Mary Ellen also shares Spanish with students ages 3 – 14 at Prince of Peace Montessori in Covington, KY, and four days each week she spends two hours tutoring at Notre Dame Urban Education Center in Covington, KY.

"I am technically retired, but I volunteer in our program for students with learning disabilities and with grant writing. I couldn't stay away. I missed the kids too much. They



give you life! We have students from every single walk of life and they all seem to get along. It's like a family here. In fact, 14 teachers are Holy Cross graduates. They wanted to come back here to teach."

"After 30+ years as teacher, then guidance counselor - I am now employed as a permanent substitute teacher. I am happy to be of service and be able to work with so many wonderful people."

"I teach Sophomores to Seniors in Algebra 2, Geometry, Pre-Calculus, and AP Physics I. My class size ranges from 3 to 31! The faculty here are so loving and helpful. You can tell they really love the school and the students. I like being a part of that.



I love my students. They are great thinkers and so respectful. I will miss seeing them in person, but now I get to see their smiles since we do not have to wear masks in our online classes! Switching to online-only in the fall semester was the start of yet a new phase of experiences. Life is full of changes to embrace and God's face is so visible in each turn of the corner."

From the Archives

SNDs have been in Covington since 1874. 147 years and hundreds of sisters later, one can imagine the records, photos, and mementos that have accumulated.



From 2006 until October 2020, Sr. Joan Terese Niklas (pictured

above) has organized and shared these historical souvenirs as archivist at St. Joseph Heights. She said working in the archives has been one of her favorite ministries, partly due to the connections it has brought her.

"Sometimes people came to me when they were working on their family tree and had a sister who was a relative," Sr. Joan Terese explained. "My thing was not so much to have everything labeled and in a drawer, but to get it out and share it with other people."

She accomplished this by creating displays, writing articles, and serving as a liaison to numerous individuals and organizations.

In October 2020, Sr. Joan Terese retired as archivist, handing off the baton to Sr. Margaret Droege. We thank Sr. Joan Terese for her service to the SND community...and to so many history buffs and genealogical researchers.

Prior to becoming archivist, Sr. Joan Terese was a teacher and director of religious education (DRE). Once while DRE, she was informed a deaf student would attend her class the next year.

"I thought I better start studying sign language!" Sr. Joan Terese said.

And so, she learned sign language only to find out the student was going to another parish.

"Still, I stuck with it and ended up working in student support services at Gateway Community and Technical College. I assisted some of the students I taught as DRE years before! The providence of how it all wound up was just so special."

Tru-D SmartUVC is an ultraviolet robot that uses UV light to disinfect the air, water, and surfaces. The St. Claire HealthCare environmental services staff use Tru-D to disinfect areas in which patients with COVID-19 or other



infectious diseases have received care.

St. Nicholas Treat in Uganda

On December 5, 2020, after some delay due to COVID-19, construction began on phase 1 of the deep well water project at St. Julie Mission in



Uganda, providing a treat of clean water on the Feast of St. Nicholas.

Thank you to everyone who has contributed in support of our sisters' water needs in East Africa. This project is different from standard wells as it pulls water from a very deep borehole, making it much more reliable for water access in an area that now experiences longer and longer dry seasons.

Sr. Colette Theobald, teacher at St. Julie Primary, wrote, "They drilled down 90 meters. There is still much to do, but at least the water was found! Now they must construct the tank, dig trenches to pipe the water to the tank, install the pump and its solar panels, build a structure around the area, and pile water to the various areas needing water. Please keep this important project in your prayers."
