Thanking Sr. Joann Schlarbaum an icon and a legend at NDA

The community of Notre Dame Academy, Los Angeles recognized Sr. Joann Schlarbaum during their Founders Day Celebration. The day started with a virtual tribute with Sisters of Notre Dame Zooming in from across the country. They shared special memories to mark her retirement from NDA. During a rosary prayer service, Sr. Joann shared with the students, "The rosary is like a kaleidoscope mirroring life with its lights, shadows, and myriad of colors.... The kaleidoscope of life with its ups and downs is worth living!" The day concluded with a car parade and food drive supporting South Central Los Angeles Ministry Project (LAMP).

Lilliam Paetzold, President of Notre Dame Academy Schools of Los Angeles, reflected on the impact of the Sisters of Notre Dame, especially Sr. Joann, on her own life and the school community.

"I started coming to NDA as a baby when my cousins were enrolled here in the 60's. My family had just emigrated from Cuba. This school

offered them a place to nurture their Catholic faith. With so much that was unfamiliar, this place and the SNDs were like a piece of home in a foreign land.

Many of my favorite memories are here with the sisters. When my cousin (also an NDA graduate) got married, I remember coming here as a little girl to take pictures on the convent lawn with the entire wedding party and the SNDs.

Our last stop for trick-or-treating every year was the convent door, a nonnegotiable tradition. They taught me in just about every year from first through twelfth grades. They were there with me

when I received my first communion, confirmation and two NDA diplomas. When I came back to work at NDA, I framed my diplomas for my office because I was so proud to be home again. Much to my surprise, I noticed for the first time that my high school diploma was signed by Sr. Joann, since she was the provincial then.

Sr. Joann, although you never were my teacher, you led and cared for the other sisters who taught us, so indirectly you were influential in my life. My daughters and nieces also benefited from your care, just as so many girls who have had the honor and blessing to know you and experience the love and care of a Sister of Notre Dame.

You have been a lifesaver for us in so many ways, from sewing costumes for the drama department, assisting in the office, supporting students in the Student Learning Commons, speaking at prayer services, breaking an Instagram record, and watching over all of us with your prayers."

THE 20TH ANNIVERSARY FOR THE SND ASSOCIATES IS A GREAT OPPORTUNITY TO HIGHLIGHT OUR PIONEERS'

PERSPECTIVES. Over the years, collaboration with the laity created many opportunities to share SND spirituality. Nevertheless, the universal call to holiness emphasized by Vatican II set the stage. In 1998, Srs. Mary Amy Hauck, Regina Robbins, Francelia Klingshirn and Rebekah Kennedy researched and designed such a program for the California province, which became the first Associate program for the SNDs in the United States.

Sr. Cristina Marie Buczkowski

During her year of Associate formation, Sr. Cristina heard God's call to join the SNDs. Today, she serves as an administrative assistant at Our Lady of Victory School in Compton.

Annabelle Gordon

Now retired from Air France, Annabelle Gordon lives in

Thousand Oaks and is a devoted volunteer in various ministries at St. Julie Billiart Parish in Newbury Park.

Tom Grasmehr

A parishioner at St. Paschal Baylon in Thousand Oaks, Tom maintains his 30-year, weekly Cursillo grouping. He is also a cyber-prayer-messenger, regularly emailing the prayer requests of his large circle of friends.

Lois Harrion

Currently, Lois Harrion is a Nursing Education Consultant in private practice and is a staff member of the Spiritual Care Department at Community Memorial Hospital in Ventura.

Prudiel Libatique

Prudiel is a Word Processing Lead for Quinn Emanuel Urquhart & Sullivan, LLP, in Los Angeles. He also serves as the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA) coordinator at St. Peter Claver Parish in Simi Valley.

Andrea Fuchs Petzi

As the owner of AF International School of Languages and AF International College, Andrea had many opportunities to network within the SND world. Since 2019, she has been happily retired.

How did you first come to know the SNDs?

Sr. Cristina: As a young adult leader at St. Mary Magdalen in Camarillo, I coordinated events at the parish and deanery level. Sr. Kathleen Burns, the SND Vocation Director at that time, joined our activities. The young adults (including me) loved her ... she had a way of

> connecting with us, explaining theology and leading us in spiritual reflection.

Andrea: I came to know the sisters through Sr. Mary Amy Hauck, my student in one of my German classes at

graduates, Sr. Mary Bernadette

Pendola. As a student, she shared information about the sisters and their work.

Tom: My sister, Wilma, attended St. Stephen's School in Cleveland many years ago ... and our daughters, Gayle and Wendy, attended La Reina High School.

Who first introduced you to the idea of becoming an SND Associate?

Annabelle: Sr. Jolisa Lazaro, then serving as the Director of Evangelization at my parish, St. Anthony's in Long Beach, invited me to consider this opportunity.

Sr. Cristina: Sr. Kathleen introduced me to this new venture that would not only "feed me" spiritually, but also help me be part of something larger than my current ministry.

Prudiel: And Sr. Kathleen also encouraged me. She was involved in young adult ministries—who can say no to Sr. Kathleen!

Since Association was such a new concept for the SNDs and our friends and colleagues, what thoughts/wonderings did you have when you first reflected on this opportunity?

Annabelle: I wondered what type of commitment would be required—financial, time, talent? My prayer life was stagnant, and I wondered if becoming an Associate, with a connection to women of prayer, would refresh my relationship with God.

Andrea: I had been discussing the concept of a "Third Order" or association with Sr. Mary Amy in 1998. We both agreed that something like this would be beneficial

to anyone who wanted to share the SND spirit. When the Associate program became a reality, I was most eager to join.

Lois: During the orientation, I had the opportunity to meet several of Sr. Bernadette's co-sisters and I immediately felt their infectious enthusiasm! The comfort I experienced in becoming an SND Associate was a "Godwink," my Lord's way of letting me know that this is a part of His plan for me.

Prudiel: My first thought was "I don't belong!" I had no obvious spiritual connection, nor charismatic affiliation (I thought) and certainly, the wrong gender!

Since 2000, what opportunities and graces have you experienced that confirmed your decision to become an Associate.

Lois: Personally, one of my most precious accomplishments is the act of forgiveness. Through some of my many Associate experiences I learned that forgiveness is a life-long process that requires continuous attention and work.

Sr. Cristina: I still remember when we learned about the SND charism-proclaiming God's goodness and provident care. As I listened it came to me that I could be the one presenting that topic because it so resonated with me. During that formation period, my heart and mind were opened to hear and accept God's call to enter the community. The rest is history. I made my covenant as an SND Associate in June 2000 and entered the community that August!

Tom: Through so many spiritual growth opportunities and the genuine community spirit, Nancy and I felt very assured that we made the right decision. In 2000, Nancy wrote this testimonial: "Becoming an Associate has been a powerful part of my faith journey. Knowing more about the work of the sisters...makes me proud to be associated with them, especially in their global efforts. The respect and love of the people here in the Archdiocese of Los Angeles for the SNDs is well-deserved. I also learned how much fun these sisters have within their community, and how wonderfully they take care of each other and the many people they know and serve."

How have you experienced the grace of being a hope-filled presence in the world?

Andrea: During my 50+ years as an educator, I was fortunate enough to meet many international students not very aware of the role God plays in everyone's life. Also, having had three Sisters of Notre Dame on my teaching staff between 1997 and 2004 was a blessing, with their

enormously positive influence. They made my schools a very special place! Many of the students remarked how they were touched by the sisters' spirit of care and compassion.

Annabelle: Through my participation in the SND Justice, Peace, and Integrity of Creation initiatives, I have experienced a greater awareness of our call to heal the world.

In a world in need of peace, what do you hope for in the future as an SND Associate?

Sr. Cristina: As we read the "signs of the times," especially the pandemic chaos, we need the Associates to discern their role in proclaiming God's goodness and provident care TODAY. Their lived experience, voice, and spiritual strength and energy are great resources for God's people—whatever and wherever the need.

Annabelle: One blessing of being an Associate is the spirit of community that I so cherish! When it was time to relocate from Long Beach, I had many options. I realized that close to my Associate community, located primarily in Ventura County, would be a great place to call home. I hope that my relationship to the SNDs and the Associates

continues to bring peace to my soul so that I, in turn, can radiate that peace and joy to others.

Prudiel: I simply hope to be able to endure the race with grace, courage and humility. That in the end, I will have reached a deeper, more authentic relationship with Christ.

In conclusion, the Sisters of Notre Dame congratulate the pioneer group of Associates, and the many who have come after them. Together, we are deepening our relationship with God through prayer, we feel impelled to be radical disciples of Jesus, and we are moved to solidarity with the poor and marginalized. In the words of the late Sr. Mary Therese Kirstein, "Our Associates always teach me so much!"

Palpable & Contagious Joy

"Contagious Joy" is the overwhelming sentiment expressed by young adults who encounter the Sisters of Notre Dame through Christus Ministries. Since 2013, SNDs have provided individual spiritual direction and small group guidance on the 4-day Caritas Retreat and Ignatian guided retreats, meeting young adults from diverse backgrounds in the process. One young woman commented on the consistent care that the Sisters have shown her, with no pressure to join the community.

Newlywed Jaclyn Guerrero shared, "Even though I obviously was not called to religious life, when I see the Sisters together it inspires me to strive for that kind of deep, meaningful connection with those around me. I see what they have with each other and I want that with my own community- my husband, family, and close friendships."

SND Associate Tam Lontok, who helps coordinate the Caritas Retreat shared. "When I think of the Sisters of Notre Dame, the Spanish term 'querencia' comes to mind. It is a place where others feel safe and a sense of home to draw spiritual strength and inspiration. Their joy, openness, experience, courage, wisdom, and deep faith attracts me and many others to love and follow God more intimately."

Since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, Christus Ministries has reached more than 1,000 young adults through virtual prayer series, helping them encounter God in fresh, tangible ways. One recent topic was *The First* Spiritual Exercises, based upon the book of the same name by Fr. Michael Hansen SJ, a method of offering elements of St. Ignatius' Spiritual Exercises in which retreatants follow a daily program of meditations and meet once a week for two hours of prayer, sharing, and sacred listening. The charism of the Sisters of Notre Dame is rooted in Ignatian Spirituality, and Sr. Kelley Rush, Sr. Valerie Roxburgh, and Sr. Jenny Zimmerman have each brought their own Ignatian wisdom to these reflections.

ThiThoa Ton, a Christus staff member, commented on how impressed she is that Sr. Val consistently stays in touch with the groups she has served. "I hear from people all the time how Sr. Val texts or calls to check in on them.

Her outreach and genuine concern for them continues. She is such an inspiration to me."

For Fr. Tri Dinh, SJ, the SNDs reflect Jesus' call of the apostles in the Gospel of Matthew. He sees the SNDs "catching" young adults up in their own joy in following Christ. He says, "They are drawing young people deeper into the life of God, and from there a sense of vocation follows. Their joy is palpable and contagious."

In her thank you remarks, Sr. Antonine said..."I'm really overwhelmed to see you here...it's such a joy for me. I'm so

grateful for the beautiful words... But this is not just for me, it's for the Sisters of Notre Dame and everyone in the history of La Reina over these 56 years. La Reina has always had great students and parents supporting us—thank you!"

First, have constant gratitude—be grateful every single day. Gratitude to God, your parents, your school, your fellow students—gratitude to everyone. Before you go to bed, write down all the things you are grateful for that day. And the second thing I want to suggest is consistent kindness—kind in thoughts, words and deeds. I promise you that you will be a happy and peaceful person."

"I will these gifts to you—from myself and from the Sisters of Notre Dame. I am your praying sister, and I will continue to pray for you even after you graduate. Thank you again for this beautiful tribute, not just to me, but to the Sisters of Notre Dame. Thank you and God bless you!"

Remembering Sr. M. Sheila Fay 1933 - 2020



Sr. Mary Sheila was born in 1933 in Waterloo, Iowa and her family moved to California several years later. She and her two younger brothers were blessed with a Catholic education

through high school. Sheila earned a scholarship to Immaculate Heart College in Los Angeles, earning a BA in Mathematics. Knowing the SNDs as her elementary school teachers at St. Rose of Lima in Maywood, she joined them when she felt called to religious life.

During her 44 years in secondary education, Sister had the distinction of ministering as a teacher, counselor and/or administrator in all four of the province's high schools. In 1996, she spent the summer in Poland teaching English to young sisters. She also treasured her 15 years as a volunteer reader at Recording for the Blind and Dyslexic. Sr. Sheila's soothing voice and ability to read mathematically complicated textbooks were invaluable!

Perhaps Sr. Sheila's most endearing quality was her ability to listen. She gave each person her full attention and wise advice. Each came away feeling supported and loved. When Sr. Sheila entered hospice this spring, she wrote a letter of gratitude to the SND community, family, friends, former students and colleagues. Their responses of love and gratitude filled her with abundant joy. Repeatedly, Sr. Sheila was characterized as a woman of great wisdom and dignity whose advice and encouragement guided many.

Dying as she lived, Sr. Sheila went home to God very peacefully early in the morning of September 18. The Sisters of Notre Dame are confident that her gracious example of a woman of faith will influence many generations.
