Over 2,500 cards were sent to LIRS (Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service) and 400 cards were sent to Sr. Joyce Bates at Casa de Hospitalidad (House of Hospitality) in Laredo, TX.

Sr. Joyce shared that the director of Catholic Charities in Laredo was very grateful. This project fills the gap of providing necessities while wanting to do a little something extra to brighten the day of folks caught in a system of uncertainties. The faces of the children and adults as they received cards confirmed that this simple but impactful project brings hope and kindness to our immigrant sisters and brothers.

Casa de Hospitalidad House of Hospitality

Sr. Joyce Bates and Sr. Roseanna Mellert have been working hard to prepare the house for volunteers who will work at La Frontera in Laredo, TX.

La Frontera is a respite center run by Catholic Charities, which offers services to those who have been released from immigrant detention centers.

Services include transportation, clothes distribution and travel care packages that include water, snacks, a throw blanket and a personal hygiene package.

Saturday, December 3rd was the Open House at Casa de Hospitalidad, with a nice turn out of Catholic Charities staff and new friends that Sr. Roseanna and Sr. Joyce have made over the past 2 months.

Service in Action

Each year in the late summer or early fall, the Sisters of Notre Dame from the Covington region offer a service opportunity in Eastern Kentucky. Sister Ruth Lubbers, the volunteer coordinator for the region and for the Vocation & Young Adult Ministry Team, works with Sue Brown who organizes service opportunities in the name of the Glenmary Sisters. This year's trip was the fourth one for volunteers from Covington or other areas to assist in Eastern Kentucky. The group, which included Margie Schnelle from our Advancement Office, Sisters Nance Hehman and Ruth Lubbers, went to Frenchburg, Kentucky and painted three rooms for Karen, a woman with health issues. Karen's rooms were transformed into brighter and airier spaces. She was delighted with how it all turned out and the group was happy to make such an impact on Karen's life.


